Hurricanedamaged boats removed, destroyed

After languishing off Interstate 75 near the Tuckers Grade exit in Charlotte County for months, boats damaged during Hurricane Irma last year have now been removed and hauled off to area landfills.

Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission officials confirmed Thursday that more than 30 boats were removed earlier in the week from Fred C. Babcock/Cecil M. Webb Wildlife Management Area land off I-75.

The vessels were brought there after being removed from area waterways during cleanup from Hurricane Irma that hit in September.

Owners had 30 days from when boats arrived at the site to claim them, but FWC records don't indicate any were returned to their owners, according to FWC spokesperson Melody Kilborn.

Fort Lauderdale-based, Paradigm Marine was the contractor that handled the destruction and debris removal for the local site, according to another FWC spokesperson Rob Klepper.

Fewer than 200 vessels statewide that were removed after the hurricane remain at four other sites and must still be destroyed, Klepper

And Kilborn said contractors have been moving from site to site to "perform destruction of vessels as effort."

At the site near Tuckers Grade, the removal process took just under a week to complete.

By Thursday, the site once strewn with barnacle-covered boats of many varieties showed no evident sign they had been there.

Before that, the boats could be seen for months after the hurricane by motorists traveling along I-75 in

Cosby found guilty of sexual assault

Comedian lashes out at prosecutor in expletive-laden tirade in courtroom after conviction in retrial

NORRISTOWN, Pa. — Comedian Bill Cosby was found guilty Thursday on charges he drugged and sexually assaulted a former basketball official at Temple University, a woman decades younger than him who said she had once considered the entertainer a mentor and friend.

The verdict in Cosby's retrial, which came on the second day of deliberations and

drew a loud gasp from spectators, came less than a year after a previous jury deadlocked over the innocence or guilt of the 80-yearold comic. The three counts of aggravated indecent assault lodged against Cosby each carry a penalty of up to 10 years in prison, a sentence that would likely put him behind bars for the rest of his life.

Cosby listened to the verdict stoically, but moments later lashed out loudly at District Attorney Kevin Steele and called him

Local adventurers aim to strike it rich

It doesn't take a pirate to hunt for treasure in the 21st century — a couple small boats, shovels and metal detectors can go a long way. But, the modern-day treasure hunt isn't as glamorous as the Discovery Channel or the movies make it seem.

Often knee-deep in mud, Southwest Floridian Mike Gattuso and a ragtag group made up of family members, former repo workers and a bounty hunter, search for treasure on Sunday mornings. More often than not, however, their "big score" is a beer can.

Their mission: finding the treasure of Jose Gaspar in the Peace River. The treasure is said to be worth \$30 million.

"This is treasure hunting," said Gattuso, "we have to find something.'

Bottom line

A group of Southwest Floridians believe they have insight as to where mythical pirate Jose Gaspar buried a treasure worth millions.

According to legend, Jose Gaspar settled along the southwest coast of Florida around 1783 and turned to piracy aboard his ship, the Floriblanca. Gaspar established his base on Gasparilla Island and became the "scourge of the Gulf of Mexico and the Spanish Main."

The myth tells that Gaspar plundered dozens of ships, collecting treasure along the way. Gaspar died between 1821 and 1822, according to the tale, soon after Spain transferred control of the Florida Territory to the United States.

Hotel added to Charlotte Commons plans

A new hotel has been added to the plans for the mixeduse Charlotte Commons development by Private Equity Group at the corner of Peachland Boulevard and Veterans Boulevard.

The Charlotte County Commission approved an amendment Tuesday to the Sandhill DRI (Development of Regional Impact) to exchange 19,440 square feet of approved commercial development for 120 hotel rooms.

Geri Waksler, land use attorney for PEG, said plans are for an extended stay hotel. Beyond that, no further details are currently available.

'The extended stay concept is looked at as something that can potentially relieve some of the demand for housing for Western Michigan University," Waksler told the Sun Wednesday.

The exchange was done using an equivalency matrix to determine how much square footage of commercial development would be required for the hotel to have

a net zero impact on traffic in the area.

"The 19,400 square feet of commercial retail would generate the same amount of traffic as the proposed 120

hotel rooms," Waksler said. Commissioner Joseph Tiseo said Tuesday he was happy with the change, and would rather have a hotel in the area than two quick-serve restaurants, which he believes would generate more traffic.

"I've had projects next to hotels, and it's almost like they're not even there," he said. "I think this is a win.

Even though the matrix shows it's net, it's got to be better than that in terms of less traffic counts with a hotel as opposed to what could be there."

PEG has already contributed more than \$6 million for roadway improvements in the area, including extra turn lanes and traffic signals at the intersections of Peachland and Veterans Boulevard and Veterans Boulevard and Kings Highway.

CHARLOTTE COUNTY — The Charlotte County branch of the United Way is teaming up with the Suncoast Campaign for Grade-Level Reading to help bring higher literacy and a love of learning to the area.

"The Suncoast Campaign for Grade-Level Reading is a community-wide effort in Manatee and Sarasota counties to help all children, especially those from low-income families, succeed in school by ensuring they read on grade level by the end of third grade," according to www.gradelevelread ingsuncoast.net.

A significant chunk of children across the nation — 67 percent — are not proficient readers by the time they exit third grade, and as many as 80 percent of these students come from low-income families.

With Charlotte County's median income falling significantly lower than those of neighboring counties Sarasota and Lee, it is imperative for the region to focus on the education of its

younger generations.

A committee of local nonprofit representatives, led by the United Way, is currently working with SCGLR and they hope to have their **Community Services** Action Plan completed by June 30.

By teaming up with groups like Big Brothers, Big Sisters and the **Charlotte Community** Foundation, SCGLR can help local students, teachers and parents increase the percentage of children reading at their grade.

One of the programs proposed is the Suncoast Summer Book Challenge. The challenge runs for 11 weeks and requires students to read and log six books at or above

their reading level.

To help local nonprofits, libraries and schools interested in participating, the Patterson Foundation provides funding depending on the number of students enrolled and the length of the course.

The book challenge is very flexible to ensure it reaches as many students as it can. Organizations can decide how long they want or need the program to last depending on their students.

"For someone in kindergarten, it wouldn't take that much time to read six books," SCGLR Director Beth Duda said, "but an older child reading on grade-level would need longer."

The goal of the program is not to create a chore but to develop a love of learning in young minds.

Individuals and organizations can also ioin Mind in the Making Facilitator Institute, offered under SCGLR.

The institute is a 16hour course that teaches adults — parents, school staff, community leaders — how to better engage with children and pass their knowledge onto them.

"We've had 625

graduates, so far. People from the Sheriff's Office, attorneys, librarians there's been a wide range of involvement and no degree is necessary to participate," Duda said.



He retired after almost 40 years of piracy, dividing the treasure between him and his crew at his base on Gasparilla Island. Supposedly, a battle was held between a British merchant ship and the Floriblanca. The supposed merchant ship raised an American flag, revealing that it was the U.S. Navy schooner USS Enterprise, which was on the hunt for pirates.

In the battle that followed, Gaspar's ship was hit by multiple cannonballs. Instead of surrendering, Gaspar is said to have wrapped an anchor chain around his waist and leapt from the bow of his ship.

The legend tells that most of his surviving crew were captured and hanged, however a few escaped. Some versions say that one of these survivors was John (Juan) Gomez, who would tell the tale of Jose Gaspar to future generations.

As the ship sank, Gomez grabbed Gaspar's seven maps and fled along the Peace River, according to Gattuso. "As he flees," said Gattuso, "the story says he paid \$300,000 as hush money to Lady Boggess. We located the Boggess family who are now married into the Collins family. Their affiliation, is part of the pirate tale that supposedly Juan Gomez had paid them off to keep them hush hush as to where he was."

The crew references a map given to them by the Boggess family — who came across the original map after finding Juan Gomez dead.

"There are parts in the treasure map that give you the places it could be," said Gattuso, "so that's why we came up with multiple locations because we wanted to be able to check those multi areas that could be a possibility."

One of those locations is marked by a large cypress tree with a Roman numeral three carved into it. That tree stands on a shoreline near the crew's search sites. Based on stories from Juan Gomez's great grandchildren, who searched for the treasure in the 1950s, there were Roman numerals marked on trees in relation to the treasure's location.

"When we found that marked tree," said Gattuso, "it shows us that the story is real because now it ties us in to their story what

they were doing back in the 1950s. That's what the motivation came from. The stories they're telling us are just as real as the buried treasure. Especially when the Collinses already found some of it.'

Gattuso said that the Collinses have found three of five safes so far amounting to \$300,000.

"That's why they want us to go look for it," said Gattuso. If the crew finds the treasure, the money will go to help finish building the church the family Boggess and Collins have started. They are \$1 million short from finishing it.

Crewmember Todd Stiger said they choose the search locations through a number of ways. Often time, the group tries to retrace the steps detailed in Gomez's grandchildren's stories.

'We put our own interpretation on it," he said. The crew also talks to long-time residents of the area to find out potential locations.

The group determined seven different potential locations where the treasure could be.

For a little more direction, Gattuso decided to go to a psychic to help hone in on the right spot.

"My mother-in-law said, 'call a psychic,'" said Gattuso. "So, I called a psychic. (The psychic) thought I was joking."

The psychic asked if Gattuso had any locations. He gave the psychic seven spots. Out of the seven, the psychic picked there spots where there would be treasure.

"... this is what gets me," said Gattuso. "(The psychic picked this location where we are going today. All I mentioned was a big cypress tree. (The psychic says) there's treasure there.'

Gattuso said the hairraiser for him was the psychic's mention of a lagoon that rested nearby the cypress tree marking point.

"Two things in this part (got my attention)," said Gattuso, "... how did you know there was a lagoon there — lagoons are (usually) closed in and how did the psychic know that it was 'open dock' to where there is a tip to it?"

When Gattuso presented this new information to his crew, Stiger said he was on the fence about it. Stiger said, "You never know ... and the idea behind this whole thing is that we come out here we all do this ... it's fun. It's a good way we spend every Sunday together."

The first stop on the trip was a small island in the river. Exiting the boat, the crew members' feet sunk into the

mud, completely dry land was scarce. An alligator egg was spotted near the docking point which made everyone cautious. With metal detectors, Gattuso and his crew searched the small land mass. The metal detector pinged in one area near the end of the small island, which matched the psychic's prediction. The group began to dig.

The crew usually digs around two feet into a site if there is a ping on the metal detector. "The problem is that you go to a certain distance," said Stiger, "if you don't find something, you keep digging and the water is going to keep coming in."

After some digging, they ran the metal detector over the spot again. Again, it pinged. After further digging, Gattuso reached into the hole and found ... a beer

"It's an adventure," said Gattuso.

"Sometimes we have a map on the wall of the river and just throw a dart at it," said crewmember Corey Bigler, laughing.

The crew returned to their boats and motored further along the river.

Stiger said the biggest obstacle for the group has been determining the location. "When we sit there and we talk about ... if in fact, Gaspar buried something ... where it would be? How deep it would settle?

On the way to the next stop, Gattuso and his crew motored along the shoreline dragging the metal detector through the river bank, no pings.

The crew spotted a beach-like shoreline up the path. They docked and searched the area. After some wandering with the metal detector, Gattuso got a ping.

They marked the spot with an "X" and grabbed the shovels. The crew dug through the sand, eventually striking water. They drained out the water and continued to dig since Gattuso was still getting pings on the metal detector.

FIVE BIG TREASURE FINDS:

Cuerdale

Found: 1840

Value: Approximately \$3.2 million

Workers were fixing an embankment of the River Ribble in Cuerdale near Preston in England. They found a lead box which contained a Viking treasure with more than 8,600 items, including silver coins, jewelry and silver ingots.

X Hoxne

Found: 1992

Value: Approximately \$3.8 million

A British farmer lost his hammer in a field. He borrowed a metal detector and discovered an oak chest filled with silver spoons, gold jewelry and coins. The treasure dates back to the 4th or 5th century.

Stafforsdhire

Found: 2009

Value: Approximately \$4.1 million

Using his metal detector on a recently plowed field near Hammerwich in Staffordshire, Terry Herbert found a trove of Anglo-Saxon treasure, including over 3,500 military-related items like weaponry, as well religious artifacts and decorative items. Although not exact, it is thought to date back to the 8th century.

Sroda

Found: 1985-1988 Value: Approximately \$120 million

An old building in the Polish town of ŚSroda ŚSlaska was being demolished. A vase was found beneath the foundation containing more than 3,000 silver coins, dating back to the 14th century. Two years later more artifacts were uncovered during the demolition of a nearby building, including more gold and silver coins and an array of jewelry, including a gold crown and a ring displaying the head of a dragon.

Caesarea Found: 2015 Value: Priceless

During a seabed exploration near the harbor of Caesarea National Park, Israel, scuba divers found nearly 2,000 coins. The coins were of several different denominations and had been minted at different times, sometime between the 10th and 12th centuries.

Eventually, one of the crew members hit something metal with the shovel: a Schlitz beer can.

Gattuso's crew is selffunded and passionate about the search and each other. Eight people make up the group. The root members of the team are in the repossession business. Bigler is from Pine Island and works in "heavy duty" commercial repossession dealing with planes and boats. Erin Melcher, a mixed martial artist, is the group's mechanic.

"Anything that breaks," said Gattuso, "he's the guy (to fix it)." Melcher is from Labelle.

Stacie Hunt is the muscle and the mind behind the group. As a bounty hunter, she "finds people (and) does a lot of the legal stuff," said Gattuso. "She comes in really handy when it comes to research and ... a little bit of everything.'

The group also includes Stiger, Gattuso's daughter Gabby and her husband Jordan Poteet (the videographers).

On the quiet drift back to the Lettuce Lake boat ramp, the crew joked with one another about the morning's hunt.

Although nothing was found, Gattuso said the real treasure of the day was being able to spend time with family and friends.

But finding a treasure would make it that much

Dearborn steps closer to greater density

ENGLEWOOD — West Dearborn Street property owners are a step closer to seeing multi-story, residential and retail mixed-use developments in the future.

The advisory Sarasota County **Planning Commission** unanimously approved comprehensive plan and zoning changes to the Englewood Town Center — part of the **Englewood Community** Development plan that will allow mixeduse developments. The amendment could increase residential and commercial density

from 13 units per acre to 25 units per acre.

The changes would be limited to properties one block north and south of West Dearborn, the main street of Englewood's historic business district.

The changes also need state approvals and a final approval from county commissioners, which is expected in the

The advisory planning commission support came only after the county staff deleted similar development changes proposed for South McCall Road from the Dearborn intersection to South Indiana Avenue. In February, commission members heard from numerous residents and property owners who did not want those changes.

But even though county staff scrapped the South McCall plan, some residents still opposed greater development densities for West Dearborn. Some feared Englewood would lose what they called its "old fishing village" charm.

"The CRA plan does not reflect the wants and the needs of **Englewood residents** and guests," said Cynthia Kjarum who described herself as longtime resident of Englewood. She gave the advisory board a petition of 200 signatures opposing changes that they viewed as the urbanization of

West Dearborn and the surrounding area.

Joyce Colmar, a Dearborn business and property owner, said the increased density is needed for redevelopment to be fiscally feasible. She's owned the vacant lot for 17 years across from the Pioneer Plaza on the 300 block of West Dearborn.

"We cannot build within the perimeters of costs on that street with the current conditions," Colmar said. "The idea you are going to ruin Englewood because one street, one section on either side of it, will become more dense, to me, is actually illogical.

"If you put more

people on that street. you preserve the area around it so that you have birds and open areas," she said.

While South McCall is out of the plan now, it's not forgotten. The county is planning a beautification project that will include sidewalks, streetlights, stormwater and other improvements.

Also, CRA manager Debbie Marks said the county will be holding next winter "focus groups" with residents, commercial and other property owners to determine what future development they'd like to see along South McCall Road.

Sarasota County to join opioid litigation

Officials want to join federal case against pill mills

SARASOTA — To protect any potential claims the county may have, Sarasota County commissioners agreed Tuesday to enter

the opioid litigation pending in a federal court in northern Ohio. Specifically, commissioners unanimously agreed to authorize

County Attorney Steve DeMarsh to engage the firm of Motley Rice LLC to represent and present any claims the county may have regarding the crisis.

DeMarsh told commissioners the firm would represent the county on a contingency basis, earning 20 percent of any recovery prior to trial, and 25 percent if the case goes to trial. If no recovery is realized, the county will owe the firm nothing.

Noting that the opioid crisis is a complex issue, Commissioner Mike Moran said the crackdown on pill mills in the state a few years ago had led to people seeking other alternatives for treatment.

Fearing that resolving the crisis might lead to a spike in heroin overdoses, he said, "I'm nervous about what the solution is and the money to fix it."

DeMarsh speculated that a potential settlement with third parties to the litigation might include a "push for treatment.'

In response to the crisis several local governments across the country filed lawsuits against drug manufactures, distributors and pharmacies alleging theories of consumer protection/consumer fraud,

false claims, nuisance, or violations of state and federal laws on controlled substances.

In essence, the plaintiffs allege that the companies aggressively marketed these pills for years while aware of the potential for addiction without warning authorities or consumers.

Due to the multitude of lawsuits filed in different jurisdictions, a panel of federal judges met in December and consolidated the cases, handing them over to District

Judge Dan Aaron Polster of the Northern District of Ohio in Cleveland.

According to The New York Times, approximately 400 individual cases had been filed. The Center for Disease Controls estimates that there are 175 deaths a day in the United States due to prescription opioids.

In January, according to the Times, Polster met with lead attorneys for the parties and appointed a panel of attorneys to engage in settlement discussions to resolve the

litigation, and imposed a ban on discussing negotiations with the media.

Attorney Joe Rice of Motley Rice is one of the members of that panel. DeMarsh told commis-

Ethics court ruling split on misuse of office case against Rob Robinson

A split-decision by the First District Court of Appeals against former North Port city attorney Rob Robinson found he had an unfair advantage for his firm while creating

two jobs for himself. The court recently ruled Robinson violated state law in 2013 after convincing the majority of the City Commission to create a zoning hearing officer and special magistrate for code enforcement officer position.

Robinson said he was the most qualified for those two positions.

According to the 23-page finding, the court found Robinson "had created an unfair advantage" for his (former) firm Nelson Hesse of Sarasota. "There is competent, substantial evidence that supports the implicit finding that Robinson acted corruptly."

The court found Robinson knew advising commissioners on a matter benefiting himself personally was "inconsistent with his public duties as a city attorney." On similar prior occasions Robinson asked commissioners to hire outside counsel so he could bid on those contracts.

The three-judge panel split its decision of the second violation against Robinson. The majority found Robinson was considered an attorney for the city and not a local government attorney as alleged in the initial complaint against him. The panel found the city charter outlined Robinson's position as an outside legal representative.

Due to the appeals' decision, instead of a \$10,000 fine by the Florida Ethics Commission, Robinson was ordered to pay \$5,000.

In a statement to the Sun, Robinson wrote he's pleased with the court's decision to overturn one of the charges.

Englewood resident Conni Brunni, who owns properties in North Port, filed the complaints with the Florida Ethics Commission. She alleged Robinson shouldn't have told North Port commissioners he was the best candidate for the newly created jobs as the special magistrate for Code Enforcement cases and the Zoning Hearing Officer at the July 28, 2014 meeting.

Robinson was the city attorney for 14 years. The Commission disbanded the resident's code enforcement board and wanted a special magistrate to preside over violation cases. Robinson wrote a draft ordinance to

create the new position. Commissioners decided they weren't renewing the contract with Robinson's outside firm Nelson Hesse and were instead hiring an in-house attorney.

Robinson asked the City

Commission to appoint him immediately. The job wasn't posted and no other applicants were sought. The then City Commissioners voted 4-1, with Linda Yates opposing, to appoint Robinson to a four-year term to both positions. Yates called it a conflict of interest

Robinson signed a letter of engagement he penned to charge the city \$275 an hour for the two new positions instead of the \$170 he had been paid as the city attorney.

"Rob Robinson penned and lobbied for his new contract as backup city attorney in 2014." Brunni said. "Then he told commissioners there was a big urgency but the case wasn't head until six weeks after he was appointed."

Brunni filed a complaint with the Florida Ethics Commission a month later.

Robinson, now an attorney with the Kirk-Pinkerton, P.A. law firm of Sarasota, resigned as the

city's special magistrate in September 2014. He earned \$10,941 for the short time he served in the new positions.

Brunni said she didn't mind that it took a long time after she filed the complaint for the process to play out - especially after the Florida Ethics Commission elected to investigate her claim. It took about a year. She and Robinson were notified of a hearing date. She drove to Tallahassee for the hearing, but Robinson didn't show up. A new hearing was scheduled in

Sarasota. "Administrative Law Judge Robert Cohen heard the case, and ruled against Robinson in January 2017," Brunni said.

Cohen ruled Robinson misused his position by creating two city jobs for himself. He was fined \$10,000. Robinson appealed to the First District Court claiming he didn't abuse his position as the city attorney and he was categorized as a

public officer - not a local government attorney.

A three-judge panel was appointed to hear the case in January 2018.

"Regarding the second charge, we are bolstered by Judge (Scott) Makar's detailed lengthy dissent in which he states ... 'Robinson didn't misuse his position by acting inconsistent with his public duties nor did he act with wrongful intent,'" Robinson wrote to the Sun. "Judge Makar concluded 'Robinson's conduct violates none of the other public ethics laws related to the procurement of legal services."

Brunni said it's gratifying the decisions made by the appeals court will affect future outcomes. She filed a complaint with the Florida Bar Association against Robinson. It's at a hearing stage, but the process was on hold pending the outcome of the appealed case.

Charlotte County, located off to the right when heading toward Lee County.

Overall, \$51 million in federal funding was budgeted for removing vessels from the water, and for pollution and hazard mitigation.

New annex nearly ready for West County

ENGLEWOOD —
Charlotte County's new
West County Annex
building is nearly complete,
and county officials and
other offices are getting
ready to move in.

The current West County Annex will be closed Friday, May 4, and Monday, May 7. County officials and other offices will move into the new building, located just behind the old annex at 6868 San Casa Drive.

The new annex will open for business Tuesday, May 8.

The new 18,900-square-foot, fouracre annex is replacing the 40-year-old, 12,000 square-foot annex. It will house the Charlotte County Tax Collectors office, which is where residents may renew license tags and obtain a driver's license. The county also reserved space in the new annex for the federally funded Women, Infants and Children (WIC) program and the Center for Abuse & Rape Emergencies (CARE).

The free nonprofit Community Care Clinic isn't waiting and is already beginning its move into the new facility.

"We're thrilled," clinic executive director Beth Harrison said Thursday. "We're moving in this weekend."

The clinic won't have phone or Internet service initially, but its medical volunteers plan to serve their patients 5 p.m. to 9 p.m. Monday and Thursday next week in the new annex.

The clinic has been operating in what had been a defunct state health clinic with less than 1,000 square feet. In the new annex, the clinic has been alloted 1,691 square feet that will include a dental examination room.

Charlotte County Tax Collector Vickie Potts has long looked forward to the new annex.

"It's the best thing that could happen for us," Potts told the *Sun* in February.

Her office occupies 1,500 square feet in the old annex and will see its space expanded to 2,986 square feet in the new annex.

The tax collector's West County office serves more than 45,000 customers annually. People waiting to be served often have to sit on chairs in the hallway of the existing annex.

A second phase of the construction project calls for the demolition of the old annex and the construction of a new parking lot. Demolition on the old annex is scheduled to begin early in June and will take about three months to complete, including construction of the new parking lot.

Until the second phase is completed, visitors to the annex will have to park in the existing parking lot. Only handicapped parking will be available in front of the new annex.

The \$6.5-million

construction project was funded with the county's 2014 1-percent infrastructure sales tax.

"Since construction is not completed yet, we do not have numbers of how much under budget we are," said Gary Burdahl, the county project manager overseeing the construction of the new annex.

"We are still under

budget though," Burdahl said Thursday.

The construction project is also being completed ahead of schedule.

North Port historic, culture board in the works

NORTH PORT — While North Port is just shy of 60 years old, the City Commission wants to ensure its culture and historic aspects are protected and represented.

The board has been a topic on the dais on-and-off for several years, which came to fruition at the latest City Commission meeting late Tuesday night. The four commissioners present — Commissioner Chris Hanks had left the meeting at the time — unanimously approved the first reading of the ordinance, which will come back on May 8 for a second and final reading.

"This goes back to 2011 when I first tried to do this," Vice Mayor Linda Yates said. "Thank you public for sticking with us; it's got one more reading and it's been a long time coming."

Several changes were requested of the board, which will consist of seven members.

The commissioners wanted to ensure three of those members were people from the general public. They also clarified no more than two members can be from the same category, which includes anthropology, conservation and

historic architecture. Four of the seven members need to be North Port residents.

Commissioner Jill Luke also wanted to make sure "cultural" was a consistent term used throughout the ordinance, alongside "historic."

"We're looking at our heritage through this advisory board," Luke said. "The heritage to rise up through this from the dirt, from the culture, from the historical aspect. So we will see our heritage be known and be spread."

The City Commission

had previously mentioned the use of a cultural and historic advisory board could be beneficial when it comes to the new direction of the Warm Mineral Springs land and building.

"Thank you for doing this, it is long overdue but that is not any of your fault and I thank you for getting to it now," said Bill Goetz, vice president and chair of Friends of Little Salt Spring. "The city is really blessed with amazing cultural resources and the sooner we get this done, the sooner experts can advise staff."

The topic will be brought back up at the May 8 meeting, which is at 1 p.m. in the City Commission chambers.

an "a**hole" after the prosecutor asked that Cosby be immediately jailed because he was a flight risk.

The judge decided

One of his most famous roles, however, was playing obstetrician Cliff Huxtable, the kindly and wise patriarch in "The Cosby Show" that ran in the 1980s and early

But in the intervening months, the #MeToo movement erupted, with scores of powerful men brought to account over charges of sexually harassing or assaulting women, often in the context of an implied threat to block victims' professional

advancement unless they submitted. The movement formed an explosive backdrop to what is viewed as the first criminal case to reach a conclusion in light of the #MeToo movement.

In Cosby's 2017 criminal trial, just one woman was allowed to testify to an episode similar to the 2004 assault that accuser Andrea Constand described — but that resulted in a hung jury. Prosecutors were more optimistic with this case as lawyers for Constand, now 45, were allowed to bring in five other women who told similar stories of being manipulated by Cosby into taking pills and then finding themselves immobilized and helpless to fight him off as he molested or raped them.

Cosby's legal team offered up a blistering

portrayal of Constand and the other accusers as opportunistic liars, and sought to undermine her credibility by producing a witness, a onetime roommate, who described hearing Constand muse about falsely accusing a famous man in order to win a big payoff. Early in the trial, the defense disclosed that Cosby had earlier paid Constand nearly \$3.4 million to settle a previously confidential civil claim.

Dennis McAndrews, a Philadelphia-based attorney who has been following the case, said the defense presented a "broader-based attack" than what was offered during the first trial. He said the strategy appeared to be designed to get at least one juror to hold out on convicting Cosby. To obtain a criminal conviction, decisions must

he unanimous During the two-week trial, the prosecution denounced what it called the defense's attempt to shame the victims into silence, and depicted Cosby as a calculating assailant who believed his celebrity would shield him against lurid accounts of assault and coercion against women who trusted him and believed he could help them in their careers. Dozens of women have come forward to accuse him.

The rest of the development includes a 500-unit apartment complex, with one-, two-, and three-bedroom apartments across from Peachland Promenades, as well as the commercial space, of which 130,560

Military museum marches into future

OUR POSITION: The Military Heritage Museum will shift its base of operations from Fishermen's Village to the IMPAC building. We believe it's a good move.

n the early days, the Military Heritage Museum did a lot of moving.

Two closets — one in an American Legion post and one in a VFW — formed its very first home about 20 years ago.

It was housed from 2001 to 2004 in an 850-square-foot unit toward the foot of Fishermen's Village – a location that bears no resemblance to its current site at the head of the Village, a popular dining and boutique shopping destination in Punta Gorda.

For three years, the museum occupied a storefront in a shopping center on Madrid Boulevard in Burnt Store Isles.

It finally landed in its current location in 2007. Since then, good things have been happening for both the museum and Fishermen's Village.

The museum operates on a \$200,000 annual budget. There's also a \$1 million endowment that matches the funds the museum raises itself. A couple of closets full of stuff have evolved into more than 20,000 artifacts, 4,000 literary titles and more than 1,000 documents — all carefully preserved and doted over by 75 volunteers and staff.

It brings in 67,000 visitors a year — all potential customers for Fishermen's Village stores.

But now the time has come for the museum to move down the street and become the first tenant of the vacant IMPAC building, a 55,0000-square-foot former business training center that Fishermen's Village bought last year

The move still needs a positive recommendation from the Punta Gorda Planning Commission and City Council approval, permissions we urge.

Clearly, the move is a win-win. From the perspective of the museum, it offers an opportunity for expansion. Plans call for the museum to occupy the entire first floor of the building, then later to operate a community theater in the building.

Kathleen Roth, the museum's interim executive director, spoke of the "increased connection" with veterans, visitors, donors and the local community.

The vision is to take the museum to the next level of technology by using holographs and "electronic docents" so people can take a self-guided tour of the museum.

For Fishermen's Village, it's the first step in revitalizing a long-vacant building, which was built in 1994. Eventually, 25 highend boutique hotel rooms will be developed in a separate part of the IMPAC building.

"This is exciting for us with the benefits of having an empty building transformed, painted and repurposed into a wonderful place that the museum and the community will be proud of," Fishermen's Village general manager Patti Allen said.


Allen said there are plans to promote the museum by operating a shuttle service between Fishermen's Village and the museum's new location.

A timeline for the move has not been set, but the hope is it will happen this summer — in time for the new snowbird

"It will be a world-class museum." Allen said.

Roth said the museum's mission is to "educate. ... That's what we do. We tell the big stories through the little stories, connecting the visitor to history."

The museum will continue to tell those stories as a page is turned in its own.

ICE and the bitter fruit of dehumanizatio

¬ he attitude of President Trump toward federal law enforcement is, to put it mildly, mixed. The FBI refused to bend to his will. So it is comprised of "hardened Democrats" engaged in a "WITCH HUNT." The FBI was, according to Trump, too preoccupied with the Russia investigation to prevent the Parkland, Florida, school shooting. Its reputation "is in Tatters — worst in History!"

But Immigration and **Customs Enforcement** (ICE) has passed the loyalty test. ICE's enforcement surge "is merely the keeping of my campaign promise,' explained the president. Referring to ICE acting Director Thomas Homan, Trump said, "Somebody said the other day, they saw him on television. ... 'He looks very nasty, he looks very mean.' I said, 'That's what I'm looking for!"

This is territory more familiar in political systems of personal

rule. The agency that defies the ruler must be discredited. The agency that does his bidding is viewed as a kind of Praetorian Guard.

Most of the professionals working in ICE would surely deny this characterization, pointing to an important legal role independent from any individual president. But they need to understand that their work is now being conflated with Trump's nativism.

increase in arrests within the country after Trump took office is now closely associated with the president's political priorities. His sweeping executive orders on immigration broadened

ICE's 40 percent

the focus of enforcement beyond serious threats to public order. Arrests of immigrants without criminal convictions have spiked dramatically. Routine "check-ins" with ICE officials can end with handcuffs and deportation. "Sanctuary cities" — a recurring presidential political obsession — are being targeted with additional personnel. Hundreds of children have been removed from parents seeking asylum and detained separately compounding their terrible ordeal of persecution and flight. ICE recently announced a new policy that makes it easier to detain pregnant women. Asylum seekers have often been denied "humanitarian parole"

Officials of the agency insist their nonpolitical mandate hasn't changed. But Homan has praised the Trump administration for taking "the handcuffs

off law enforcement." Whatever their intention, ICE agents are being used by the president to send a message of callousness. And they are tying themselves to Trump's political fortunes in the process.

The job performed by ICE is essential to American security, and not easy. Agents must prevent some truly dangerous people from entering and staying in the country — gang members, drug dealers and terrorists. But it is also their job to deal with asylum seekers - men, women and children fleeing from gangs, targeted for death by drug cartels and oppressed by terrorist states. Some of the worst people in the world, and some of the most sympathetic people in the world, are processed by immigration officials. It takes care and discernment to make this

ICE is not currently an agency famous for its care and discernment. In

distinction.

releasing an immigration activist detained by ICE early this year, U.S. District Judge Katherine B. Forrest said, "It ought not to be — and it has never before been — that those who have lived without incident in this country for years are subjected to treatment we associate with regimes we revile as unjust. ... We are not that country."

Accusations of abuse in ICE custody are numerous and serious, and they preexisted the Trump era. An investigation by ProPublica and the Philadelphia Inquirer reported cases of racial profiling, fabricated evidence and warrantless searches — all given little scrutiny by overwhelmed immigration courts. During the last few years, there have been hundreds of accusations of sexual abuse, racial slurs, abusive strip searches and verbal harassment in ICE jails, prisons and detention centers. For an institution that

claims "zero tolerance" for such practices, it seems to get a lot of serious complaints. One asylum seeker, Gretta Soto Moreno, has called the facilities worse than normal prisons because ICE "feels like it can treat immigrants any kind of way.'

This is the bitter fruit of dehumanization — in a facility, in a system, in a country. It is unclear if Trump would even regard such a reputation as undesirable. He has effectively given

permission for bullying. This is an issue ripe for more rigorous congressional oversight — even an independent commission to investigate charges of physical and sexual abuse in the ICE system. But this would require a critical mass of elected Republicans to give a damn about the rights and dignity of migrants. It is a distant dream.

A story of the haves and the have-not-as-much

ometimes it seems as though government at every level only listens to those with deep pockets.

A point in case is not that many years ago, when the residents of Deep Creek found out that I-75 was going to be expanded. They requested meetings with the State Department of Transportation to request a sound mitigation wall to protect Deep Creek from increased sound pollution from the additional traffic lanes.

Members met with DOT several times, and a wall for Deep Creek was rejected every time. Strangely a wall was built on the west

side of I-75 that protects Kings Gate, a development owned by the Benderson Corporation.

It is interesting that the only sound study was done in 2004, just after Hurricane Charley, and it was a computer simulation. No actual sound readings were taken. At that time there were almost no homes constructed on the Benderson side of I-75.

A wall for Deep Creek was rejected even after members of the Deep Creek sound mitigation committee submitted decibel readings in Deep Creek far in excess of state and federal environmental standards.

Finally, citizens of Deep Creek decided on another method. They had access to a study done at the University of Michigan that demonstrated that a stand of Bamboo, like plantings, could mitigate the sound if planted next to the interstate. Since Deep Creek owns a 40-foot right of way adjacent to the interstate, the thought was that planting clumping Bamboo in that 3,000-plus-foot-long area would reduce the sound pollution that affects Deep Creek, and also negatively affects property values. The bamboo would grow to 40 feet in height, and would provide a significant reduction in the sound that is now reflected from the wall that was built on the west side of I-75 to protect the Benderson property.

Amazingly, the chairman of the Deep Creek Committee found that every part of that area was listed as Scrub Jay lots. I find it stunning that an

area immediately adjacent to I-75 would be attractive to Scrub Jays. Also, every lot east of Rio De Janeiro Boulebard in Deep Creek Sec. 23 is considered acrub jay territory! This includes the entire area of Deep Creek Golf Course as well.

This kind of biased classification may cause expenses that would preclude any sound mitigation by a bamboo barrier.

Surprisingly, just across I-75, not one square inch of the Benderson property are classified as Scrub Jay lots. Not even one inch of the golf course there. Amazing it seems that scrub jays are unable to

fly across I-75. If I was a conspiracy theorist, I might think that the deep pocket Benderson Corporation might have "convinced" state or federal bureaucrats to exclude their property from scrub jay limitations.

Is there a solution? Only if our state and federal representatives step up to the plate to protect middle class citizens from the over reach of bureaucrats instead of meekly submitting to the demands of rich corporations. We as free citizens have the power to demand from our elected officials that our property values also count!

s the museum of human nature, aka the United States **Holocaust Memorial** Museum, marks its 25th anniversary, it continues to receive artifacts, such as a letter handwritten on a yellow scrap of paper. It was donated to the museum by Frank Grunwald, 85, who lives in Indianap-

He was the younger of two Czechoslovakian boys who sit smiling on their mother's lap in a photograph the museum has. It was taken before this Jewish family was swept into the Nazi murder machinery. Frank, then 11 and known as Misa, is alive because unlike his brother John, then 16, Frank did not limp. In July 1944, their father was segregated with male prisoners who were working in an Auschwitz factory. The boys were with their mother in the Czech family section of the camp when a Nazi noticed John's limp and selected him for gassing. Unwilling to have John face death alone, on July 11, Vilma went with him, leaving behind this letter to her husband:

"You, my only one, dearest, in isolation we are waiting for darkness. We considered the possibility of hiding but decided not to do it since we felt it would be hopeless. The famous trucks are already here and we are waiting for it to begin. I am completely calm. You — my only and dearest one, do not blame yourself for what

happened, it was our destiny. We did what we could. Stay healthy and remember my words that time will heal — if not completely — then — at least partially. Take care of the little golden boy and don't spoil him too much with your love. Both of you — stay healthy, my dear ones. I will be thinking of you and Misa. Have a fabulous life, we

must board the trucks. Into eternity, Vilma." So, the museum presents human nature's noblest as well as vilest manifestations. It has received 43 million visitors, 90 percent non-Jewish, many of whom have had opportunities to talk to survivors, such as Fanny Aizenberg, who in her 102nd year still comes most Sundays. Located just off the Mall, one of the world's most pleasant urban spaces and the epicenter of American politics, the museum inflicts an assaultive, excruciating knowing: Nothing — *nothing* — is unthinkable, and political institutions by themselves provide no permanent safety from barbarism,

brittle crust. This is why the Holocaust is the dark

which permanently lurks

beneath civilization's thin,

sun into which this democracy should peer. Calling the Holocaust unfathomable is a moral flinch from facts that demand scholarship, which the museum enables. It has, for example, more than 900 video interviews with witnesses and collaborators. And perpetrators, such as Juozas Aleksynas, a member of a Lithuanian police battalion that committed genocide in Belarus in 1941:

"We were issued Russian guns and bullets ... some were exploding bullets. ... A person's skull opens up so fast. ... They would carry children the little ones — they'd take the others by the hand. They lie down, lay the child next to them. ... First you shoot the father. ... How would the father feel if the child was shot

by his side?" An album found long ago in an abandoned SS barracks contains photos of Auschwitz guards and administrators at leisure — singing, picnicking. It includes some of the few pictures of a short, darkhaired man -- Dr. Josef Mengele, who escaped prosecution for his "medical" experiments, drowning in 1979 while swimming in Brazil.

In his mindopening 2017 book "Why? Explaining the Holocaust," Peter Hayes says the subject "continues to resist comprehension." Resist, but not defy. His many conclusions include the awesome — for better or worse — power of individual agency: No

Hitler, no Holocaust. But Hitler began tentatively, with small measures. Hayes concludes his book with a German proverb: Wehret den Anfangen beware the beginnings.

Today, there is an

essentially fascist government in Hungary. Anti-Semitism is coming out of the closet: The Labour Party, which might form Britain's next government, is riddled with it, from the top down. Blood-and-soil tribalism — degenerate successor to throneand-altar conservatism — is fermenting across Europe. And there is a name for

what is happening to the Rohingya in Myanmar: genocide. The museum of human nature remains what it would prefer not to be: pertinent to understanding not only the past but the present.

How do those who work at the museum, immersed in the task of making us remember the unspeakable, maintain their emotional equilibrium? By also remembering Vilma.

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Babcock Ranch offers Lee County 2,250 acres valued at \$23.6M

Making good on promises made at a series of community meetings, the developer of Babcock Ranch has offered to sell 2,250 coveted acres to Lee County's 20/20 program.

Kitson and Partners LLC has filed an application to sell the land to the county preservation program. It is owned by the company's Babcock **Property Holdings** subsidiary.

Babcock Ranch developer Syd Kitson told Lee County audiences during a series of community meetings last year that the site would be offered to the county once approval was in hand for the 4,157 acres of Babcock ranch located in the county.

County Commissioners granted Kitson the comprehensive plan and zoning changes needed to build the Lee County portion of Babcock Ranch at a meeting several weeks ago.

Kitson Senior Vice President Gary Nelson has projected the value of the site at \$10,500 per acre. At that price, the parcel would total \$23,625,000. However, county procedures for a large land acquisition require multiple appraisals to be conducted.

Last year's \$42.4 million purchase of the Edison Farms property east of Interstate 75 was based on three appraisals. The property is adjacent to the county-owned Bob Janes Preserve, which consists of 5,620.37 acres acquired for \$41.5 million nearly 12 years ago. The cost per acre for the Janes Preserve was \$7,390.72. At that price, the 2,250 Babcock Ranch acres offered to the county would cost about \$16.6 million.

The land offered to the 20/20 program includes 497 acres on which development has been approved.

Babcock's offer is contingent on the county agreeing to allow the 1,630 units that could have been built on a slice of the property to be placed on another part of the Babcock Ranch property. "There would be no

homes on the easternmost pods that were in the development application, instead those units, that density, would move to the western portion of the site," said Tina Matte, a spokeswoman for Babcock Ranch. In setting a value for the property, Kitson has offered to value the land based on what it is worth without the development

entitlement Babcock Ranch was granted by the county.

Essentially, the land is being offered to the county at a discount.

This is entitled land, and entitled land has a higher value." Matte said. "Syd felt that by using that raw land price rather than an entitled land price, it would be more fair to the county and to the 20/20 program."

The county's 20/20 fund has about \$42 million in the bank, but that includes funding for maintenance and improvements to the existing preservation land.

Kitson & Partners bought the 91,000-acre Babcock Ranch in 2006 and later sold 73,000 acres to the state for preservation.

Lee County Commissioner Frank Mann, who has voted against the Babcock Ranch development in his district at every opportunity, takes a positive look at acquiring the conservation property.

For one thing, Mann said, the land is adjacent to the Bob Janes Preserve, a 5,620-acre property that he has commended as a water recharge and wildlife habitat area. For another, he notes that it makes the preserve accessible to North Fort Myers.

"I was always hopeful that we would someday add it because it is immediately adjacent to the Bob Janes Preserve," Mann said. "This would just expand the Bob Janes right up against North River Road in North Fort Myers."

The parcel is the same property on which Kitson and the county attempted to negotiate a 20/20 sale more than a decade ago. That deal fell apart because appraisals were based on comparable sales that did not reflect the drop in real estate values in the county after the start of the Great Recession.

Nelson said that a recent sale of 430 acres to Florida Power & Light for \$10,800 justifies the \$10,500 per acre valuation for the Babcock property. In the run-up to the

county commission vote to approve the project, Kitson held meetings and was repeatedly asked about the 20/20 donation.

"We did a lot of public outreach, in Alva, in North Olga and in Bayshore and at every single one of those meetings at least one person said 'are you going to offer those eastern pods to 20/20,' Matte said. "Syd said 'I will when we get through this process' so this is really him keeping a

The chair of eYes on 20/20, a citizens group created to support the conservation program, said it would be a good addition.

'We have always believed that is an important parcel, it would be great if the county could get its hands on it," said eYes on 20/20's Barbara Manzo. "It's a valuable piece of property, we would support that purchase, absolutely."

The offer to negotiate the sale of the property comes as commissioners grapple with future funding for the 20/20 program. The 20/20 fund is supposed to be maintained at \$40 million in reserves. A big purchase such as the Babcock parcel could make money tight for maintenance and buying additional property.

Commissioner Larry Kiker has suggested keeping a running balance of \$40 million plus a 20 percent overage in the fund. Renewed funding for the program depends on the largess of commissioners, who are in the midst of discussions about how, when and by how much to replenish the 20/20 account. County staff is expected to make a recommendation at a commission work session next month.

The county has committees working on the 20/20 program that have had a difficult time making a quorum over the past year.

It also still needs to be reviewed by county staff. "There's a lot of work to be done," said Betsy Clayton, county spokeswoman.

The April meeting of the Conservation 20/20 Land Acquisition and Stewardship Advisory Committee, which evaluates potential sites, was canceled when a quorum could not be reached. Meetings have been repeatedly canceled over the past year. Commissioners appoint members to the committee, which has significant membership from both developers and conservationists. Commission Chairman Cecil Pendergrass recently speculated that the county has "almost exhausted" potential 20/20 sites.

An 84 percent majority of county voters reaffirmed the program last year, 20 years after a nonbinding referendum helped launched the program, which has made 130 purchases, setting aside 29,000 acres for conservation.



Court backs state in felons' rights fight

TALLAHASSEE — With time running out, a federal appeals court late Wednesday sided with Florida in an escalating battle over the state's process for restoring voting rights for former

prisoners. U.S. District Judge Mark Walker had given Florida until Thursday to create a new process after ruling in February that the state's current system is unconstitutional and arbitrary, with decisions possibly swayed by politics and racial factors.

But a three judge panel of the Atlanta-based 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals blocked Walker's

ruling while it considers an appeal from Gov. Rick Scott and other Florida Republican officials.

"We are glad that the 11th Circuit Court of Appeals has stayed the lower court's reckless ruling," said John Tupps, a spokesman for Scott. "Judges should interpret the law, not create it. Gov. Scott will never stop fighting for victims of crime and their families."

The decision by the court came less than two hours before Scott and GOP officials were scheduled to hold an extraordinary late-night meeting of the state's clemency board where they were poised to adopt new rules. The meeting was scrapped after the

appeals court sided with Florida in a split decision.

Florida's clash over voting rights comes as Scott campaigns for the U.S. Senate seat of Democrat Bill Nelson in a state where as many as 1.5 million felons remain disenfranchised by the state's ban that is included in Florida's constitution.

Walker's ruling had kept the ban intact, but he had challenged the current system that requires a former prisoner to wait between five and seven years before they can even ask to have their voting rights back. The governor and the three elected Cabinet members then decide each request individually, subject to the governor's unilateral veto.



Window coverings mimic tree branches to deter birds

GAINESVILLE (AP) — The University of Florida is experimenting with a unique window design that mimics tree branches to help prevent bird collisions.

School officials say birds hitting windows has been a campus-wide problem for years. Mark Hostetler is a professor of wildlife ecology and conservation in UF's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences. He says they asked students to monitor buildings two years ago to see where the bulk of the collisions were occurring.

The new window treatments have vertical lines similar to tree branches and other obstacles that are too narrow for most birds to fly through, so

they avoid them. Hostetler says no bird collision deaths were recorded after installing the treatments in Newins-Ziegler Hall.

Troopers: 17 vehicles involved in crash near Orlando


ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — The Florida Highway Patrol is investigating a crash involving 17 vehicles near Orlando.





'Honor Our Past, Celebrate Our Present, **Anticipate Our Future':** St. Edmund's recognizes 125 years in Arcadia

or St. Edmund the Martyr Episcopal Church in Arcadia, 2018 marks its 125th anniversary. In 1893, St. Edmund first opened its doors to the people of Arcadia, offering hospitality, knowledge of faith and a stronger relationship with God, according to the church website, www. episcopalarcadiafl.com/.

The church has stood on the same land for the last 125 years, and even damage from hurricanes could not slow the congregation down - after Hurricane Charley, St. Edmund's helped the surrounding community by providing food and supplies. Before a physical church was even built, legend has it the land on which St. Edmund's sits held the first religious service in all of Florida.

"The original church building was built on the site in 1897; it is now used as parish hall,' St. Edmund's Deacon Robert Vaughn said. "The mission of 'St. Edmund, Martyr & King' was

formed in 1893."

To celebrate, the church has already begun planning a special gathering in November, the actual anniversary

"We are planning a church service officiated by our bishop (Bishop Dabney Smith of the Episcopal Diocese of Southwest Florida), former parishioners and clergy, current parishioners and guests on Saturday, Nov. 17. There will also be a reception or luncheon of some sort. Perhaps a dinner the evening before. Everything is only in the planning stage," said Vaughn.

Since last November, a committee made up of church leaders and active members from the community has been coming up with ideas for festivities and ways to raise money for this year's party, with possibilities including raffles and pancake dinners.

The church is also working on writing a comprehensive history, a collaboration with the DeSoto Historical Society and a local library display to raise awareness for the anniversary.

"We had wanted to do even more," Pat Moore, interim treasurer of St.

Edmund's, said, adding, "some things didn't work out so we're just doing what we can.'

Light Notes: Mysterious incident brings answer to prayer

It was as if she were mentally wringing her hands, the car steering wheel clasped firmly. How could a petite nurse handle a lanky hospice patient alone?

As her automobile sped across town, Lorna Runge did what came naturally

"I'm praying, 'Lord, I need an extra pair of hands," said the now "60-something" registered nurse as she recalled her imminent home visit back in 2000. "He was a tall man — I'm only 5 feet - and he's over 6 feet. I knew I couldn't turn him."

The retired nurse had volunteered her assistance when she learned that the husband of a church acquaintance was dying of terminal cancer and spending

final days at his Pasco home. Lorna had worked in local hospitals for years and in her

new "leisure" time since retiring had completed classes for parish nursing. Her expertise and the couple's need seemed to go hand in hand.

But when the call from the elderly patient's wife came on short notice, Lorna was without anyone to assist her. And that's when this diminutive nurse had prayed for a big answer.

"When I arrived, a neighbor had just come over to visit and Hatched onto him because I thought he could help — be an extra pair of hands - but he was reticent," Lorna said, recalling her initial relief followed by disappointment.

Never mind. Lorna had a few quick care items to finish before she would make an attempt to turn the patient, predictably unable to lift his own weight in the process.

"God has always given me

somebody to come alongside

over the years, an extra pair of

hands," Lorna said, explaining how she has cared for several family members.

But her need this time was immediate. What Lorna couldn't imagine was that help was already on the way.

At the same time Lorna had been praying, a couple across town was just heading out their door with two items on their "to-do" list — mall-walking and dropping off a recorded Sunday

"We were on the highway," said Gene Wallace of Richland, Washington, a retired senior technician at Pacific Northwest National Laboratories, as he remembered how he and his wife were in conversation. "I asked her, 'Should we see our friend first or go mall-walking?"

The decision was made to walk first for an hour or so and

then go visit. But within minutes of the

couple's discussion, the hospice

patient's doorbell rang - the home where Lorna needed help. As the front door opened, there stood almost 6-foot tall Gene, his wife at his side.

"We were halfway to the mall when I heard an audible voice over my shoulder say 'Go see him now!" Gene said, shaking his head at the memory, a man who has rubbed shoulders with scientists in the workplace and has his name on four patents. "I didn't want to argue."

Lorna Runge is glad he didn't. The extra pair of hands arrived right on time.

Seems like God had the situation in his hands all along.

Cyprus regains rare Orthodox Christian mosaic stolen in 70s

NICOSIA, Cyprus — A rare 6th century mosaic depicting St. Andrew that was taken from a looted church in the Cyprus' breakaway north has been returned after four decades, the head of the island nation's Orthodox Christian Church said Monday.

Archbishop Chrysostomos II said that the artistry that went into the mosaic coupled with its rarity made the work a symbol of Cyprus' "stolen heritage.'

It is among only a handful of mosaics to have survived a period during the 8th and 9th centuries when many Orthodox icons were destroyed.

The mosaic showing a bearded St. Andrew — among Christ's first Apostles — was



one of several that went missing from the Church of Panayia Kanakaria after Cyprus split into ethnic Greek and Turkish sides in 1974.

A Turkish art dealer, Aydin Dikmen, was arrested a quartercentury later for selling that piece and others from Kanakaria Church, as well as artworks from other churches.

Most of the Kanakaria Church mosaics have now been repatriated with the exception of

one of St. Luke.

London-based Greek Cypriot art dealer Maria Paphiti located the St. Andrew mosaic in 2014 after another dealer asked her to verify the origin. When the dealer was informed that the mosaic belonged to the Cyprus Church, he agreed to return it as long as his expenses were covered.

Paphiti reached out to Greek Cypriot businessmen Roys Poyiadjis and Andreas Pittas for help covering

the cost of the mosaic's repatriation, which came to 50,000 euros (\$61,200.)

Archbishop Chrysostomos honored the three of them Monday during a ceremony at Cyprus Church headquarters.

Cyprus hosts a second mosaic of the same

rarity and time period depicting the Virgin Mary. A third resides in the Orthodox monastery of Saint Catherine at the foot of Mount Sinai.

after praying about it. Black Mormons still account for only a small percentage of the church's 16 million

members worldwide. A 2013 church essay disavowed the ban and explained that it was put into place during an era of great racial divide that influenced early Mormon teachings.







North Korean leader is first to cross border in 65 years

GOYANG, South Korea — With a single step over a weathered, cracked slab of concrete, North Korean leader Kim Jong Un made history Friday by crossing over the world's most heavily armed border to greet his rival, South Korean President Moon Jae-in, for talks on North Korea's nuclear weapons. Kim then invited Moon to cross briefly north with him before they returned to the southern side.

Those small steps must be seen in the context of the last year — when the United States, its ally South Korea and the North seemed at times to be on the verge of nuclear war as the North unleashed a torrent of weapons tests — but also in light of the long, destructive history of the rival Koreas, who fought one of the

20th century's bloodiest conflicts and even today occupy a divided peninsula that's still technically in a state of war.

It was all smiles Friday as Moon grasped Kim's hand and led him along an blindingly red carpet into South Korean territory, where school children placed flowers around their necks and an honor guard stood at attention for inspection.

Beyond the surface, however, it's still not clear whether the leaders can make any progress in closed-door talks on the nuclear issue, which has bedeviled U.S. and

South Korean officials for decades. North Korea's nuclear and missile tests last year likely put it on the threshold of becoming a legitimate nuclear power. North Korea claims it has already risen to that level.

Kim's news agency said that the leader would "open-heartedly" discuss with Moon "all the issues arising in improving inter-Korean relations and achieving peace, prosperity and reunification of the Korean peninsula" in a "historic" summit. It's the first time one of the ruling Kim leaders has crossed over to the southern side of the Demilitarized Zone since the Korean War ended in 1953.

The greeting of the two leaders was planned to the last detail. Thousands of journalists were kept in a huge conference center well away from the summit, except for a small

Pompeo sworn in as secretary of state

WASHINGTON — Mike Pompeo took over as America's top diplomat Thursday after being confirmed by the Senate and sworn in across the street minutes later. The new secretary of state immediately dashed off to Europe, in an energetic start befitting the high-stakes issues awaiting him from Iran to North Korea.

The hard-charging former CIA director secured support from 57 senators, with 42 voting no — one of the slimmest margins for the job in recent history. Every past nominee to get a roll call vote since at least the Carter administration received 85 or more yes votes in the Senate, with the exception of Trump's first secretary of state, Rex Tillerson, who got 56.

He was sworn in at the Supreme Court by Justice Samuel Alito, a fellow Italian-American, who said he was "proud" to officiate for the occasion. Pompeo, in a statement relayed by the State Department, said he was "delighted" to serve as America's top diplomat.

Senate committee OKs bill to safeguard Mueller

WASHINGTON — Bipartisan legislation to protect special counsel Robert Mueller now lies in the hands of Senate Majority Leader Mitch McConnell after the GOP-led Senate Judiciary Committee voted Thursday to advance it.

McConnell, R-Ky., has said the bill is unnecessary and he won't let it reach the Senate floor. But the chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee added to the pressure on McConnell by voting for the measure and saying McConnell should change his mind.

"While my constitutional concerns remain, I believe

this bill should be considered by the full Senate," said Sen. Chuck Grassley, R-Iowa.

Republicans have split on the issue amid President Donald Trump's repeated criticism of Mueller's Russia investigation. That break was apparent Thursday as four Republicans joined Democrats in the 14-7 vote to pass the legislation from committee. For now, the move is largely symbolic, given McConnell's opposition, but it shows the complexity of Republican support for Trump when it comes to the president's attacks on Mueller.

Nearly all GOP senators say Trump shouldn't fire Mueller. But Republicans who support the legislation say it's necessary to guard against presidential

interference by giving Congress more oversight power.

Two Republicans and two Democrats introduced the bill this month as Trump ramped up criticism of Mueller, who is investigating potential ties between Russia and Trump's 2016 campaign as well as possible obstruction of justice by the president.

Trump appeared to suggest Thursday he has no intention of trying to fire Mueller, for now. But he left open the possibility he could change his mind.

"I am very disappointed in my Justice Department. But because of the fact that it's going on, and I think you'll

Investigators: DNA from genealogy site caught serial killer

SACRAMENTO, California — More than three decades after his trail went cold, one of California's most prolific serial killers and rapists was caught by using online genealogical sites to find a DNA match, prosecutors said Thursday.

Investigators compared the DNA collected from a crime scene of the Golden State Killer to online genetic profiles and found a match: a relative of the man police have identified as Joseph James DeAngelo, 72, who was arrested at his suburban Sacramento home on Tuesday.

Authorities didn't give the name of the site, one of many that allows people to send in their DNA and find long-lost relatives, like Ancestry and 23andMe

They also didn't outline the rest of the investigative in nearby Exeter, Visalia

process — how they used that match to home in on DeAngelo, the former police officer accused of being California's notorious Golden State Killer. Despite an outpouring of thousands of tips over the years, DeAngelo's name had not been on the radar of law enforcement before last week, Sacramento County District Attorney Anne Marie Schubert said.

Contacted Friday, both Ancestry and 23 and Me. com said they weren't involved in the case.

Investigators also revealed Thursday that DeAngelo is the prime suspect in the 1975 killing of a community college teacher, raising the total number of his alleged victims to 13.

Detectives are trying to link Joseph DeAngelo to the slaying and about 100 burglaries that occurred in Visalia, in Central California, while DeAngelo served as a police officer

Police Chief Jason Salazar said.

The police chief said he believes DeAngelo is the so-called Visalia Ransacker, who terrorized the farming community about 40 miles south of Fresno from early 1974 until late 1975.

Authorities alleged that he was responsible for 12 murders and dozens of rapes in California from 1976 to 1986. The suspect, they said, was tied to many of those crimes through DNA.

The Ransackers' crimes have not yet been added

to the tally announced Tuesday in Sacramento because there is no DNA evidence connecting DeAngelo to the Visalia crimes, Salazar said.

DeAngelo is suspected of shooting to death journalism teacher Claude Snelling after Snelling caught him trying to kidnap his 16-year-old daughter, Salazar said.

DeAngelo matches the description of Snelling's killer, and the serial burglar operated the same way DeAngelo is alleged to have operated in the other crimes, Salazar said.

The Visalia suspect used sophisticated "pry tools" to gain entrance to locked homes, just as DeAngelo is alleged to have used in the other crimes, Salazar said.

The Visalia suspect was seen wearing a ski mask and eluded capture because of an apparent deep knowledge of police work.

"He was very elusive and always had a good

escape route," Salazar said.

Visalia police also have fingerprints and shoe tracks that will be investigated for matches to DeAngelo. Detectives will look to see if items taken during the Visalia burglaries are uncovered during the investigation of DeAngelo, Salazar said.

Also Thursday, investigators searched DeAngelo's home, looking for class rings, earrings, dishes and other items that were taken from crime scenes.

Authorities were seeking weapons and other items that could link the suspect to the crimes, Sacramento County Sheriff's Lt. Paul Belli said. He declined to say what, if anything, investigators had found.

Investigators backed two vehicles, a motorcycle and fishing boat out of the home's three-car garage and installed tarps to block prying eyes and news cameras.

understand this, I have decided that I won't be involved," Trump said in a telephone interview with "Fox & Friends." "I may change my mind at some point, because what's going on is a disgrace.'

The legislation would give any special counsel a 10-day window to seek expedited judicial review of a firing and would put into law existing Justice Department regulations

that a special counsel can only be fired for good cause.

The four lawmakers who wrote the legislation — GOP Sens. Thom Tillis of North Carolina and Lindsey Graham of South Carolina and Democrats Chris Coons of Delaware and Cory Booker of New Jersey — hoped committee approval would give them more time to find enough support in the full Senate.

After the vote, the committee's top Democrat stepped up that effort.

'The American people must know the truth, and this bill should now

be brought before the full Senate for debate and a vote," Sen. Dianne Feinstein of California said in a statement.

With most Democrats on board, the bipartisan group had worked this week to gather additional Republican votes. That included negotiating with Grassley, who floated an amendment that included increased reporting to Congress by the special counsel.

Democrats initially opposed that, saying it could undermine the investigation if the special

counsel had to reveal too much to Congress during the investigation. But the two sides reached a compromise.

The revised amendment would require that notification after the investigation was done, along with a report detailing the investigation's findings and explanations of any charges. It would require notification if a special counsel were removed.

Republicans who supported the bill could be at risk of angering Trump and some of his supporters they represent.

Grassley, Graham, Tillis and Sen. Jeff Flake, R-Ariz., joined Democrats to advance the bill.

In opposing the bill, Utah GOP Sens. Mike Lee and Orrin Hatch said it was unconstitutional and unnecessary because Trump already knows that he would face political ruin if he fired Mueller.

"Firing Mueller would cause a firestorm and bring the administration's agenda to a halt. It could even result in impeachment," Hatch said.

But Tillis said the bill was necessary to protect

not just Mueller but future special counsels, and he said Congress should leave constitutional questions for the Supreme Court to decide.

White House aides have said Trump doesn't intend to fire either Mueller or Deputy Attorney General Rod Rosenstein, who oversees Mueller's investigation. But White House legislative director Marc Short said last weekend that he couldn't rule it out in the long term because it's not known "how far off this investigation is going to veer.

Facebook and big tech stocks rally as US indexes climb

NEW YORK — U.S. stocks climbed Thursday as Facebook led a rally by technology companies. Most of the market moved higher as interest rates declined from the fouryear highs reached over the last few days.

Facebook saw its stock price wither last month after its data privacy scandal, but shares surged Thursday as the controversy didn't appear to affect the social media platform's business in the first quarter. Other big technology companies like Alphabet and Microsoft also rallied and reversed some of their recent losses.

Strong first-quarter results from companies including Chipotle Mexican Grill and O'Reilly Automotive helped retailers and other consumer-focused companies. Amazon surged and energy companies also climbed. Stock indexes rose and interest rates decreased after a Commerce Department survey showed business investment decreased in March for the third time in the last four months.

Scott Wren, senior global equity strategist for the Wells Fargo Investment Institute, said investors were happy to see the decline in business investment because it might encourage the Federal Reserve to raise interest rates at a slower clip.

"To me the biggest risk (to the market) is the Fed, and the Fed hiking rates too much, given at least the level of economic growth we expect," he said.

The S&P 500 index jumped 27.54 points, or 1 percent, to 2,666.94. The Dow Jones industrial average added 238.51 points, or 1 percent, to 24,322.34. The technology-heavy Nasdaq composite advanced 114.94 points, or 1.6 percent, to 7,118.68.

The Russell 2000 index of smaller-company stocks added 7.43 points, or 0.5 percent, to 1,557.89.

Three months ago the S&P 500 and Dow closed at all-time highs. At that time they had repeatedly set records for a year and a half. But since Jan. 26 the market has been hit by worries about rising inflation and a potential trade war between the U.S. and China, and big names like Facebook and Amazon have had a rough ride. The S&P is down 7.2 percent in the last three months and the Dow has slumped 8.6 percent.

Facebook surged 9.1 percent to \$174.16 after the company's advertisers appeared to shrug off the Cambridge Analytica privacy scandal. Facebook said its revenue jumped and there were few signs users or advertisers were abandoning the company since the scandal broke in mid-March.

Alphabet, Google's parent company and the only digital publisher larger than Facebook, rose 2 percent to \$1,043.31. Twitter gained 1.7 percent to \$30.27.

Facebook has faced a backlash about how it collects and uses data since the revelation that Cambridge Analytica, a data mining firm linked to the Trump campaign, had gained information on up to 87 million of its users.

down 5.9 percent since then, and other technology companies have also stumbled as investors worried about the possibility that the government would start regulating them more harshly, which could affect their profits.

Amazon jumped 4 percent to \$1,517.96. It rose another 6 percent in aftermarket trading as Wall Street was pleased with the online retailer's first-quarter results.

Wren, of Wells Fargo, said that big name technology and consumer-focused stocks have struggled since the market reached its recent highs, but they should continue to do well.

"This cycle isn't over and technology and the consumer discretionary sector are going to continue to participate in the upside (for the market)," he said.

Chipotle Mexican Grill climbed after the company said sales improved in the first quarter, raising hopes that the chain is recovering from repeated food safety scares. The shares rose 24.4 percent to \$422.50. They traded as high as \$757 in mid-2015.

Bond prices edged higher. The yield on the 10-year Treasury note dipped to 2.98 percent from 3.03 percent.

Benchmark U.S. crude oil inched up 0.2 percent to \$68.19 a barrel in New York. Brent crude, used to price international oils, rose 1 percent to \$74.74 a barrel in London.

Wholesale gasoline gained 1.1 percent to \$2.11 a gallon. Heating oil rose 1.1 percent to \$2.16 a gallon. Natural gas rose 1.3 percent to \$2.82 per 1,000 cubic feet.

Microsoft Windows adapts as its business importance declines

For Microsoft, Windows is no longer a core business so much as a complement to the company's other offerings.

The company still makes money from Windows, the computer operating system that helped catapult the Microsoft brand to success more than three decades ago. But Windows' share of the business has shrunk.

The company on Thursday reported third-quarter revenue of \$26.8 billion, an increase of 16 percent over the previous year. By contrast, Windows licensing revenue grew by just 4 percent.

The slow growth of Windows sales is not too much of a worry for Microsoft, as the Redmond, Washington, company is using Windows to get individuals and businesses to spend on other products. That means giving out free updates to Windows 10 on a regular basis, rather than holding out for customers to pay for new versions every few

"By making Windows less restrictive, they're creating a more beneficial environment for the adoption of other products," Morningstar analyst Rodney Nelson said.

Under CEO Satya Nadella, Microsoft has been boosting its efforts on internet-based services in an acknowledgment that people are buying personal computers with Windows less often and are instead

spending their time on phones and other devices.

These services, mostly designed for business customers, include the cloud computing service Azure and subscriptions for the Office 365 suite of workplace software such as email and spreadsheets. For individuals, Microsoft has also been using Windows to steer people to ad-support services such as Bing searches or as a portal for its Xbox gaming system.

The shift was a bold move for a company that depended so much on Windows licenses for revenue. Windows still made up 29 percent of Microsoft's total revenue in 2010, three years after Apple's release of the first iPhone began shaking up the PC market. By last year, Windows was pulling in about \$15 billion in annual revenue about the same amount as a decade earlier, but now only about 16 percent of the company's total business.

Microsoft's earnings for the January-March

quarter beat Wall Street forecasts in both revenue and profit, powered largely by the performance of the cloud and Office businesses. It reported profit of \$7.42 billion, or 95 cents per share.

The company doesn't release its total Windows revenue in its quarterly reports. The revenue comes from license fees paid by manufacturers that install Windows on PCs and servers.

Nelson said Microsoft will still get a short-term benefit from consumers and businesses that are still cycling off Windows 7 or Windows 8 and moving onto new computers equipped with Windows 10.

But Nelson said the long-range view under Nadella, who became CEO in 2014, is to expect less revenue from Windows over time. "Pretty much from

Day 1 Satya has been de-emphasizing Windows," Nelson said. "Windows probably isn't going to matter nearly as much in 10 years as it did 10 years ago."

A diet high in purines can bring on a sudden gout attack

DEAR DR. ROACH: I have gout in my big toes. Does uric acid cause gout? Also, I read that gout is caused by red meat and seafood. Is only shellfish considered seafood, or any fish, such as haddock and salmon? — D.E.B.

ANSWER: Gout is a disease associated with uric acid crystals (strictly speaking, it's monosodium urate, the sodium salt of uric acid). They are deposited in soft tissues, joints or bones. It often is seen in its acute phase, commonly in the first joint of the big toe, where it is exquisitely painful, red and swollen. However, some people can have a chronic form of gout, with uric acid crystals visible in the soft tissue, often in cool areas of the body, such as the ears and hands. These depositions are called "tophi," and the condition is called "tophaceous gout."

A diet high in purines (a chemical that gets broken down into uric acid) can precipitate a gout attack in people who are genetically predisposed. There are many foods that have high amounts of purines.

I recommend the discussion about this from the Mayo Clinic (at https://tinyurl.com/gout-foods). Some meats are much more likely to cause problems, including organ meats (liver, sweetbreads), some seafood (scallops and haddock are bad, salmon is not), and alcohol (beer is worse than wine). Too much protein of any kind needs to be avoided. People with recurrent gout should be on medication to prevent problems.

DEAR DR. ROACH: | am 90 years old and weigh 126 pounds. I got a pacemaker one and a half years ago, with ablation of the AV node to stop atrial fibrillation. I have been very tired most of the time. My medications are: diltiazem, Crestor, Eliquis and Lasix.

I was on 40-mg Lasix twice daily, but I developed shortness of breath about a month ago, and my doctor doubled the dose to 80-mg Lasix twice daily, which took away my shortness of breath. The last lab test results all were fine except blood urea nitrogen, which was 37 (reference range 8-26); and creatinine, which was 1.66 (reference range 0.44-1.00).

I have very low blood pressure. Over the past eight days, it has averaged 108/56. Last night I got up around 3 a.m. and didn't feel well. My blood pressure was 87/50; 10 minutes later it was 106/50. A week ago, my pacemaker was adjusted a bit to give me more energy, which helped.

My question is, Should the Lasix be reduced? My doctor wants to keep everything as is. I think my blood pressure is too low, and I feel weak and tired. — V.S.

ANSWER: The blood pressure results you report are low and certainly could explain symptoms of feeling tired. Even though I think it's a good idea, without knowing more about you I can't recommend reducing medications. The reason is your shortness of breath — which responded to a higher dose of furosemide (Lasix, a powerful diuretic that forces the kidneys to remove excess salt and water) — may be due to an element of heart failure. "Heart failure" is a scary term, but it means your heart needs help in order to provide blood your body needs.







The North-South contract appears to have no chance. There is no side entry to dummy's ace of diamonds so there is a certain club loser to go with the three major suit losers. Sometimes, however, something happens to a defensive trick and it is hard to assign the blame as to why.

West continued with the king of hearts at trick two followed by another heart, ruffed by South. The

queen of spades was led and taken by East's ace. A club or a diamond shift by East would have settled the matter, but East reasonably went for an uppercut in the trump suit by returning his last heart. Declarer's trumps were too good for an uppercut to work. South ruffed high and drew the outstanding trumps in two more rounds.

South cashed one more trump, coming down to the ace-10-9 of diamonds and the jack-10 of clubs in the dummy. All would have been well for the defense had East discarded two diamonds on the spades, but East had high-lowed in clubs to show strength there so he had only discarded one diamond.

When South led his last trump, West thought it was possible that declarer had started with no clubs and all four of the missing diamonds. Accordingly, West discarded the queen of clubs. South shed the nine of diamonds from dummy and then overtook the queen of diamonds with dummy's ace. He finessed East out of the king of clubs and brought home his contract. This all really happened and East-West were experts. What happened to that trick?







CIA spokesman Nicole de Haay said the agency has already released more than 99 percent of CIA information that was in the Kennedy assassination records collection. "CIA

The files released Thursday — mostly FBI and CIA records — detail how authorities combed through tips in the wake of Kennedy's death, including a report from a woman who claimed she saw a man who looked like Oswald at a party in Mexico City.

Another file shows ex-CIA officer David Atlee Phillips being grilled by lawmakers about whether he believed Oswald was the lone assassin. Phillips said he wished there was information showing the Soviets or former Cuban leader Fidel Castro had played a role "because there are so many people, especially on college campuses who are convinced the CIA did it."

But Phillips said since there was no evidence showing Cuban or Soviet involvement, he had to believe Oswald was just "a kind of loony fellow who decided to shoot the President."

EPA chief seeks to divert blame for ethics woes

WASHINGTON (AP) — **Environmental Protection** Agency chief Scott Pruitt, yet another Trump administration official with his job on the line over ethical concerns, took heat from lawmakers Thursday over his profligate spending and lobbyist ties and tried to divert responsibility to underlings.

The EPA administrator said "twisted" allegations against him were meant to undermine the administration's anti-regulatory agenda, and he denied knowing details of some of the extraordinary spending done on his behalf at the

WASHINGTON (AP) -The parents of U.S. college student Otto Warmbier filed a wrongful death lawsuit against North Korea on Thursday, saying its government tortured and killed their son.

Fred and Cindy Warmbier filed the lawsuit in the U.S. District Court in Washington, D.C., seeking compensation for the death of the 22-year-old, whose plight had compounded tense U.S.-North Korean relations.

Otto Warmbier, who was a student at University of Virginia, was arrested by North Korean authorities in January 2016 for stealing a propaganda poster and sentenced to 15 years in prison with hard labor. He died in June 2017, days after ne was repatriated to the U.S. with severe brain damage.

THE HAGUE, Netherlands — Russian diplomats brought alleged "witnesses" from Syria, including an 11-year-old child, to the headquarters of the global chemical weapons watchdog in the Netherlands to disprove allegations of a chemical weapons attack by the Syrian government.

The group of Syrians then held a press conference where they denied any poison gas attack took place in the town of Douma this month and said that some of them were filmed in "staged videos" in the aftermath of the April 7 suspected

Russian diplomat Alexander Shulgin said the aim of the briefing was to present "evidence" that allegations of a chemical attack in Douma are "completely null and void."

"Today we can prove that the footage of the White Helmets is a crude

staged action," he said, in reference to the Syrian opposition's Civil Defense group of first responders. Shulgin is Russia's ambassador to the Netherlands and representative to the global chemical weapons watchdog.

At the presser, the witnesses claimed there was no smell of chemicals, and said people who were choking had inhaled smoke and dust from a bombardment.

The press conference included testimony by an

11-year-old boy, Hassan Diab, who was seen in the aftermath of the April 7 attack being doused with water by first responders.

The boy later appeared in reports on Russian state media, in which he and his father tell Russian correspondent, Evgeny Poddubnyy, that the entire attack was staged.

The report was heavily promoted by Russia's ambassador to the United Nations, who screened it in front of the U.N. Security Council.

In the report, Diab is seen with his father speaking at what appears to be a Syrian government facility where Russian military personnel could be seen emerging from a building.

Russia had organized Thursday's briefing at the OPCW headquarters ahead of time for about 15 Syrians, including at least three young children.

The United States, France and Britain denounced the press conference as a stunt and an "obscene masquerade" by Russia. The three nations have blamed Syria for the suspected chemical attack in Douma and launched airstrikes a week later, on April 14, targeting suspected Syrian chemical weapons facilities.

German cops nab pair with 130 pounds of stolen chocolate

BERLIN (AP) — Two people are under investigation in Germany after being caught in possession of some 60 kilograms (130 pounds) of stolen chocolate.

Braunschweig police said Thursday a 35-year-old woman was nabbed by an alert cashier at a supermarket on Tuesday as she checked out only a few items but had 9 kilograms (about 20 pounds) of purloined chocolate concealed under her floor-length skirt.

Upon further investigation, police found another 50 kilograms of chocolate bars, boxes of chocolates and other confectionery stashed in five bags with her 39-year-old accomplice in a car outside. Police say "even

for those with a high affinity for chocolate the amount of candy found could not be considered for personal use." The two are under investigation for commercial shoplifting.




Penguins erase 2-goal deficit, beat Capitals 3-2 in Game 1

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That will give you perspective.

Jonny Venters making it back to pitch in the majors for the first time in nearly six years isn't just a nice, little comeback story. It's a major accomplishment, one that can be described as a testament to hard work, resiliency, determination, faith and a litany of other phrases, none of which seem properly descriptive.

"There simply is not a word to accurately assess what this man has done," longtime Tampabased agent B.B. Abbott said. "Resilient seems wholly lacking for what he has accomplished.

"He has not thrown a pitch in the big leagues for almost six years and has endured three additional surgeries, with only 27 minor-league innings in between. He has spent months away from his family rehabbing for an outcome that was so improbable and unknown that to simply call it unprecedented feels almost hollow for what he, Viviana and his family has gone through.

"Whether this is for one day or five years, it is nothing short of incredible that he will be walking onto a majorleague field (Wednesday) in Baltimore as a bigleague pitcher. In a word, or three: pretty damn cool."

The smile on Venters' face said plenty as he walked into the Rays clubhouse late Wednesday afternoon, the circumstances of the day adding to the drama.

He was in uniform for Triple-A Durham's 10:35 a.m. matinee, expecting to pitch there. A rain delay sent him and other relievers scrambling from the bullpen back to the clubhouse. He got

called into Bulls manager Jared Sandberg's office and told he was being called up, and needed to get going. He called his wife and parents, grabbed some clothes out of his truck (since he'd been living in a hotel and Durham was going on the road) and headed to the airport.

"It's hard to put into words how I'm feeling," said Venters, 33. "It's been an emotional day. I'm excited to be here, grateful for the opportunity."

The Rays plan to give him plenty of chances, certain that even though he's no longer the flamethrower he was for the Braves during a 2010-12 run that included an All-Star appearance, that he can get out lefty hitters, relying now more on a fastball in the low 90s, a sinker and a changeup.

He showed that during a solid spring training, then his first few weeks at Durham.

And Wednesday, when he came in to face Chris Davis to start the sixth of a 5-4 game and needed only four pitches to get a ground out.

He was nervous jogging in, his heart racing a bit, comparable, he admitted, to his majorleague debut in April 2010.

Then reflective, even a bit overwhelmed, when he got back to the dugout after his outing, taking in the magnitude of the moment.

"It was an amazing experience, just to get out there on a big-league mound, in a big-league game with this group of guys and be able to get an out and help this team win," he said. "A special thing I'll never forget the rest of my life. My family was here, they made their flight. A dream come true really."

For Venters to get back, he not only had to overcome the physical

issues with his elbow but the doubts raging in his head.

Not only if he could make it, but if it was even worth still trying. Most pointedly after he did all the work rehabbing from the third Tommy John surgery, only to have the elbow ligament tear again after five June appearances for the Class A Stone Crabs.

"I think I all but made my mind up I wasn't going to do it again," Venters said. "And I spoke with the doctors and my family, and kind of everybody thought it was a good idea to do it again. So I thought I felt like if everybody that I cared about thought that way, that I'd be stubborn to not try it again. So here I am."

As if the story wasn't special enough, including being what the Rays say is the first pitcher to make it back to the majors after three Tommy John surgeries, team officials rave about what a great influence and greater example Venters was on their minor-leaguers at all

And how strong an impression he made on their Port Charlottebased rehab staff led by Ioel Smith, which also celebrated the promotion.

"The organization is really happy, and for good reason," manager Kevin Cash said. "He's a good pitcher and probably a better person."

When Venters last pitched in the majors, he was 27, and he and Viviana had one kid. Chipper Jones was still playing for the Braves, who lost in the NL wild-card game.

Sergio Romo was the only current Rays reliever who had been in the big leagues.



wner makes offer to buy Wembley Stadium

LONDON - Jacksonville Jaguars owner Shahid Khan is eyeing a stadium deal on NFL draft day: Buying Wembley.

The English Football Association has received an offer from Khan of about 600 million pounds (\$840 million) for the national soccer stadium, which would continue to host England games and major cup finals after a sale.

Wembley has staged regular-season NFL games since 2007 and Khan's Florida-based franchise started playing at the 90,000-capacity stadium in 2013, the year Khan bought London soccer club Fulham.

He told The Associated Press he expects to own Wembley within eight to 12 weeks, increasing the prospect of an NFL franchise in London.

"That's possible in the long, long term," Khan said. "Right now, it's about having the certainty we can have three or four games there and then seeing how the market receives it and building on it.

"(Owning Wembley) gives certainty of an NFL presence in London. The first thing you want with certainty is you want a

venue. And this gives us a stadium solution for us or anyone else."

London. NFL games will also be played this year at the new home of Premier League club Tottenham, which is under construction.

The 60,000-plus capacity stadium was designed with NFL-sized changing rooms and to ensure the grass soccer pitch can be retracted and kept under lights below the stands when the artificial surface is required for NFL.

But Khan envisages after the Tottenham deal expires in a decade that only Wembley could be staging NFL games in London.

Wembley, which first opened in 1923, was

rebuilt at a cost of 800 million pounds before reopening in 2007. For most of its existence it has not been owned by the FA.

Selling off Wembley would give the FA up to 500 million pounds to invest in soccer development, which could increase the chances of England winning its first World Cup title since 1966. The governing body would retain the rights to hospitality packages for games, which are valued at 300 million pounds.

"For the FA," Khan said, "it would mean Wembley Stadium returning to private

MLB: Red Sox

Yawkey Way changed over racist past

BOSTON - Boston officials Thursday approved changing the name of Yawkey Way, the street outside Fenway Park, because of allegations former Red Sox owner Tom Yawkey was a racist who resisted signing black ballplayers in the 1940s and '50s.

The city's Public Improvement Commission unanimously approved a proposal by current Red Sox ownership to call the stretch of road Jersey Street, which it was originally named before being changed in 1977 to honor Yawkey the year after he died.

"The spirit of Boston is being renewed," said Walter Carrington, 87, a former member of the Massachusetts **Commission Against** Discrimination who investigated the Red Sox organization in 1959.

The vote drew immediate condemnation from the Yawkey Foundations, the charity named for Yawkey and his wife,

"As we have said throughout this process, the effort to expunge Tom Yawkey's name has been based on a false narrative about his life and his historic 43-year ownership of the Red Sox," the organization said.

"The drastic step of renaming the street, now officially sanctioned by the city of Boston (and contradicting the honor

the city bestowed upon Tom Yawkey over 40 years ago), will unfortunately give lasting credence to that narrative and unfairly tarnish his name." The Red Sox filed a

petition with the commission in February and said that restoring the Jersey Street name is intended to reinforce that Fenway Park is "inclusive and welcoming to all."

Principal owner John Henry told the Boston Herald last year that "I am still haunted by what went on here a long time before we arrived.'

Under Yawkey, who owned the club from 1933-76, the Red Sox was the last team in the major leagues to cross the color barrier. Pumpsie Green

became its first black player in 1959, 12 years after Jackie Robinson played for the Dodgers.

Prior to that, the team chose not to sign several prominent black players, including Robinson and Willie Mays.

The Yawkey Foundations acknowledged that in its statement, but said the good Yawkey and the foundation have done far outweighs the negative, including the more than \$300 million the foundation has provided to organizations throughout the city.

"We have always acknowledged that it is regrettable that the Red Sox were the last Major League baseball team to integrate," the statement said.

Close-knit team gets tested with season on line

INDIANAPOLIS - The Indiana Pacers have been winning together, losing together and fighting together all season.

Now they need to demonstrate their resilience once more as they try to save their season by rebounding from an emotional loss to LeBron James and the Cleveland Cavaliers.

"Nobody thought we'd be in this situation," Victor Oladipo said, referring to the playoffs. "It's important for us to stick together now because we've seen where it can go, where it can take us and it's great."

The immediate problem is recent history doesn't bode well for

the underdog Pacers, who trail 3-2 with Game 5 set for Friday in Indianapolis.

meanwhile, is trying to reach the conference semifinals for the first time since 2014.

But the Pacers don't care about stats, projections or conventional wisdom - as they've proven repeatedly this

streets of Punta Gorda's rejuvenated downtown and celebrate the good life in Punta Gorda.

Better yet, entry is free, yes, free, but that brings with it a cautionary note that needs some explanation and a brief history lesson: If you love going to the Block Party, you should drop some greenbacks into the donation buckets at the entry gates. The Block Party costs upwards of \$150,000 to stage every year; last year, patrons tossed nearly \$19,000 into donation buckets at the entry gates in appreciation of the return of the Block Party. Those contributions helped guarantee funding for this year's celebration.

You should not, however, just view a contribution as helping to maintain an event that's just for fun. The truth is, from its beginning, the Block Party is woven into the fabric of downtown and vital to many local nonprofits that do so much good in the community.

In 1987, the first Block Party was organized to commemorate the centennial of Punta Gorda. It was the capstone event of a year-long series of centennial celebrations celebrating the city's heritage.

What many people do not know is the decrepit state of downtown Punta Gorda back then. Buildings and streets were in disrepair, and the area was on its way to becoming a shell of the vibrant economic engine it once was. The city, as part of the celebration, began finding money to spruce it up, a rejuvenation still going on today with a great deal of success.

Because of its resounding popularity and impact on downtown, city officials asked the volunteer organizers to continue the event on an annual basis. Punta Gorda Days Inc. was incorporated as a nonprofit and entered into a partnership with the city to organize the biggest one-day event in Southwest Florida.

The city continued to fix downtown and in addition chipped in with \$5,000 in seed money and free police, EMT and

set-up and clean-up assistance. Many years of success followed, and attendance grew to 30,000 to 40,000 people, many from other areas of the state who were seeing the city for the first time and came back to spend money.

A decade ago, the city withdrew financial support for its Block Party, but the organizers have kept it going, despite the economic recession and financial hardships, because it is so important to nonprofits.


It is imperative the Block Party now receive financial support from the people who attend and enjoy it. A donation is not like giving cash to a single nonprofit or good cause. A Block Party donation is seed money that will multiply over and over through the years as the nonprofits return to raise money for their good works.

It is also necessary for the continuation of the Old Timers luncheon, which is held in concert with the Block Party. This annual gathering of people who have lived in the city for 30 years annually draws 600-700 people from all over the country. The luncheon organizers simply won't be able to afford the liability insurance required without the Block Party's support.

If you haven't been to a Block Party, ask those who have why they go. Guaranteed you will hear them mention the great entertainment, good food and drink, the chance to see old friends and celebrate life in Punta Gorda. What that all boils down to is this: The Block Party makes them feel good.

Go, and you will feel even better than good if you reach into your wallet at the entry gates. You will still have fun and can take satisfaction that you have helped nonprofits to keep on doing the good works that, in addition to the weather and the our community spirit, make this city special.



Plans progressing on airport growth

Terminal expansion is in the offering at the Charlotte County Airport, but the nature of that expansion depends on the cost. According to Airport Manager Frank Toolan, traffic on Naples Airlines at the Punta Gorda terminal has exceeded all expectations since the local airline began service last fall. The Charlotte County Development Authority which runs the airport, was presented yesterday with two plans. Either an addition to the present terminal or construction of separate facilities to the south. Originally Naples Airlines' President John Van Arsdale commissioned architect Willard Bowman, of the present terminal, to draw plans for an addition to be attached by a corridor to the south end of the facilities, already in operation. Van Arsdale now asked Bowman to draw a rough plan for an unconnected terminal. The approximate cost of the separate building would be from \$200,000 to \$280,000.

Lawyer replacement in Punta Gorda

State Attorney Joe D'Alessandro Wednesday said he hopes to find a replacement for Assistant Attorney, Daryl Casanueva in Punta Gorda. Preferably a week before he plans to resign to join a Port Charlotte law firm. D'Alessandro's staff is interviewing applicants now for the position to help Assistant State Attorney Eugene Berry, in the Punta Gorda office.

More gas tax cash coming

The county can expect an additional \$13,900 plus interest from the state Department of Transportation, according to Clerk of the Circuit Court, Buddy Alexander. Alexander requested



the money this week as the balance due the county in withheld gas tax revenue. The county received the bulk of the balance due last month and deposited it in the county road and bridge department's budget. Early last month county commissioners approved a motion to collect excess seventh-cent gas tax funds on a month-to-month basis. On demand, ending any chance of further "windfalls" from the DOT.

Vocational Center courses reflect market demand

When the Charlotte County Vocational Center opens in September 1980, about 20 courses will be taught for people in need of training to qualify for positions. The Center is designed to offer training in various area occupations to residents seeking training to qualify at businesses in need of personnel. Tom Wagoner, co-coordinator of vocational education for Charlotte County schools, said the courses, approved by the State Department of Education are the products of more than a year of research concerning labor market demands and trends in the Charlotte area. The Vocational Technical Center is to be built in the Murdock area of Port Charlotte. It could accommodate 527 students during its first year offering courses in health, construction Center will also provide re-training programs. The labor market outlook will be re-evaluated every year.

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

where she personally interacts with middle-school children. On average, 13 youth programs are held each month at the library.


